

Through heritage, building our identity, today and tomorrow

Learning from our past to carry ourselves towards our future

In Quebec, in Canada, whether in research, creation or repertoire, dance has reached an enviable maturity. Such a rich and unique heritage makes it possible to transmit and recreate activities, write stories and build identities.

Dance heritage is intertwined with individual and collective adventures which, in one way or another, influence current practices. It is a "common good", which testifies of the history of the dancing community, its journey, its accomplishments, its aesthetic tendencies, its relationship to audiences. It is a "landmark", a source of information, a factor of cohesion, a sign of identity and shared memories.

Heritage conservation finds its full purpose in transmission. It benefits artists and their collaborators as much as the general public and researchers. Today, it is fundamental to "constitute" this heritage, to conserve it, to enhance it and to transmit it in order to fully contribute to the development of dance.

Educate new generations

We often mention the names of characters who marked their discipline. In Quebec, personalities such as Anne Hébert, Félix Leclerc, Jean-Paul Riopelle, Maurice Richard, Guy Lafleur, are recognized leaders of our societal identity. Quebec also has worthy ambassadors of dance whose work, presented on our national stages and well beyond our borders, deserves to be recognized.

While the visual arts, music, literature... have the museums, orchestras and theaters to maintain and preserve the "culture", it must be recognized that dance has very little of this opportunity. Like a young painter can refer to the work of Paul-Émile Borduas, dance artists and the public could benefit from recognizing the characters who preceded them and getting to know better the works they created.

Developing a culture of restaging

Restaging productions are opportunities to meet new audiences, to rediscover those of the early hours, and above all, to contribute to the recognition and notoriety of a work. On a larger scale and in the longer term, they allow Quebec and Canadian dance to be known, its artists and craftsmen, its repertoire, its roots and its developments, its trajectory and its history.

Dance, a leading art, a complete art

Dance is an art of expression whose richness, evolution and value are rooted in our disciplinary history and our collective memory. The Work of Fernand Nault is without any doubt an important part of the Quebec and Canadian choreographic heritage.

Since 2020, André Laprise, trustee of the Fonds chorégraphique Fernand Nault, has been organizing and coordinating *Faire danser le patrimoine*, a rich program of activities to promote artistic heritage in dance.

Fernand Nault

An international career at multiple levels


Fernand Nault first had an important American career before returning to settle in Quebec. He had a brilliant career as a choreographer and artistic director at Les Grands Ballets Canadiens in Montreal and in the United States, especially in Louisville, Kentucky and in Denver, Colorado. His remarkable works have enabled Les Grands Ballets Canadiens to become "Grands" in Quebec, Canada and internationally. Many of his works have been acquired and produced abroad, in the United States, Asia and Europe. His rich experience of 21 years, acquired at the American Ballet Theater in New York, as a dancer, coach, ballet master, repetitor and then pedagogical director of the company's school, allowed him to make a major contribution in the professional training program of École supérieure des Grands Ballets Canadiens, now École supérieure de ballet du Québec.

A great Quebecer, a great Canadian, a dance giant

Fernand Nault had the chance to learn from "Masters" who were writing the history of dance. For the Quebec of its time, he was the link between tradition and innovation. His Work, whose universality and contemporaneity remains, embodies a significant page in our socio-cultural history, the affirmation of our identity. His ballets tell, among other things, the societal breakup of a historical era.

A remarkable contribution to Quebec's status

A recognized artist of the Quiet Revolution, Fernand Nault was very much involved in terms of creation and interpretation. The success from his creations have, among other things, enabled dance to take a "place" in Quebec culture in addition to contributing greatly to the financial health of several organizations. Creator, builder and important teacher, he was, until the end, a man of firsts, of very constructive initiatives for the Quebec and Canadian cultural milieu.
